The Great Lakes/Michigan DFA Chapter invites all Doane/Doans to the Doane Family Association's 53rd biennial reunion in Saginaw, Michigan. Saginaw is located in beautiful east-central Michigan on Saginaw Bay. The event will be held July 21 – 26 at Saginaw Valley State University. Founded in 1963, the school celebrated its 50th anniversary last year with a series of events and a major fund-raising initiative.


Several branches of Doanes/Doans settled in Michigan in the early 19th century. Some came directly from the east and others came south from Canada. Our reunion committee's lineages descend from at least three of Deacon John's children. Dick Doane, and his sister Mary Ann Sindt, trace their Doane ancestors in Michigan back to 1834, and Linda Doane's ancestors came in 1848. Arlene Thompson's family came in 1856, and Bill Fineout's Doane family moved into the state in the late 1860s. The Doans, who intermarried with the Dows of chemical company

DFA members will see the Doan name on campus. The Herbert Dow Doan Science Building boasts a new 1,500 square foot, state of the art greenhouse, and honors Doan (1922-2006) as a founder and supporter of Saginaw Valley State University. The Marketplace at Doan Center is the main eatery.

Reunion accommodations are in a comfortable, air conditioned residence hall, Living Center North, built in the 1980s. The Living Center is just a few steps from the Marketplace and other campus sites, so there is minimal walking over flat terrain to the DFA meeting and dining rooms, and the DFA Research Center. Right outside the entrance to the Living Center is a large rock that groups visiting campus can "decorate." DFA members are invited and encouraged to leave their mark(s) on this graffiti rock. Paint and brushes will be provided! There is also a physical fitness room and a pool available for guests.

Find out about all of these Michigan Doan(e)s during the reunion, and reconnect with cousins from around the country who frequent these fun-filled, educational DFA gatherings.



DFA Reunion Tours

Two organized group tours are planned during reunion week and reservations are required. Participants will travel in buses equipped with air conditioning and restrooms.

Frankenmuth Tour

Spend Wednesday in Frankenmuth, a town filled with Old World German charm. This town boasts 75 unique shops, the world-famous Bavarian Inn Lodge, featuring European-themed décor, and other interesting

sites. Our first stop in Frankenmuth will be



the well-known Bronner's Christmas Wonderland, where it's Christmas every day. For more than 65 years, the Bronner family and staff have helped families make holiday memories from their Christmas store, the largest in the world. After a visit to this special store, lunch will be served at the Bavarian Inn Lodge, operated by the Zehnder family

since 1927. The Zehnders take great pride in their German heritage and their delicious meals reflect this. After lunch, explore this quaint town, located on the banks of the Cass River, at your leisure before heading back to Saginaw for dinner.

The Henry Ford Tour

Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village

Spend all day Thursday at "The Henry Ford", the largest indoor-outdoor museum in America. The complex is comprised of the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village. Located about 100 miles south/southeast of

Saginaw, this legendary attraction is world famous. Nearly one hundred historical buildings were moved to the Greenfield Village site from



their original locations and arranged in a village setting. Buildings include Henry Ford's birthplace, the Logan County Courthouse, the Wright Brothers' bicycle shop, and a Cape Cod windmill. The museum was planned to give visitors an idea of what life was like since the

founding of the country. Some buildings date from the 17th century and others are modern. Many are staffed by costumed interpreters who demonstrate period tasks such as farming, sewing, and cooking in character. Several buildings house craftsmen making pottery, hand-blown glass, and tin items. Their work provides demonstrations for visitors, and produces materials used in the village and to sell to visitors.

Greenfield Village is located on 240 acres of land of which only 90 acres are used for the attraction. The



remaining tract is natural and contains a forest, river, and extra pasture for the sheep and horses. A transportation system of Model T Fords, a 1931 Ford bus, an historic passenger

train and horse drawn vehicles conveys visitors around the village. Several eateries are available on the grounds.

The adjacent Henry Ford Museum began as Henry's personal collection of historical artifacts. He was a life-long collector, and on display is the 1961 Lincoln Continental that carried President Kennedy when he was assassinated, a ten-person bicycle, the rocking chair from Ford's Theatre in which President Lincoln was seated when he was assassinated, a collection of Stradivarius violins, and many more rare and unusual items.

Your combination admission ticket covers the entire complex.

Other Sight-Seeing Options

If you choose to arrive early or stay after the reunion, there are also many other things to see in the vicinity on your own. In Saginaw, sight-seeing opportunities include the Saginaw Zoo with train rides and walking paths, a Japanese Tea House and Garden, and the Hoyt Genealogical Library.

In nearby Midland are Dow Gardens. The Dow Chemical Company is also located in Midland. Two of its company presidents were Doans during the 1950s and 1960s. Bay City boasts the Tall Ships that offer day cruises. There are also boat tours of Bay City. Delta College has a great planetarium, and south of Saginaw is Cross Roads Village where one can experience life in a small town in the 1800s with sawmills, steam railroads, and cider mills.


About Saginaw

Saginaw, Michigan (2010 pop. 51,508) was incorporated in 1857 from a settlement near Fort Saginaw. There were other early settlements that were also added to the town. A thriving lumber town in the 19th century, Saginaw also became an important center of industry and manufacturing that prospered during the 20th century.

Much of the industry has revolved around automobile production. The numerous forested areas provided good lumber, and transportation options on the Saginaw River and via railroads for transporting products, provided a formula for success.

International Airport is located in Freeland, MI and Bishop International Airport is in Flint. There is also a

bus transit system throughout the city.
